Christmas Day December 25, 2020

Many people in the United States celebrate Christmas Day on December 25. The day celebrates Jesus Christ's birth.

Is Christmas Day a Public Holiday?

Christmas Day is a public holiday. It is a day off for the general population, and schools and most businesses are closed.

Family feasts are often a part of Christmas Day celebrations.

What Do People Do?

People celebrate Christmas Day in many ways. It is often combined with customs from pre-Christian winter celebrations. Many people decorate their homes, visit family or friends and exchange gifts. In the days or even weeks before Christmas Day, many people decorate their homes and gardens with lights, Christmas trees and much more.

It is common to organize a special meal, often consisting of turkey and a lot of other festive foods, for family or friends and exchange gifts with them. Children, in particular, often receive a lot of gifts from their parents and other relatives and the mythical figure Santa Claus. This has led to Christmas Day becoming an increasingly commercialized holiday, with a lot of families spending a large part of their income on gifts and food.

Many Sunday schools, churches and communities organize special events. These can include decorating the neighborhood or a shopping mall, putting up a Christmas tree and planning a Nativity display, concert or performance. A lot of plays and songs have a aspect of Christmas as a theme. Some groups arrange meals, shelter or charitable projects for people without a home or with very little money.

Public Life

Government offices, organizations, businesses and schools are closed, almost without exception. Many people visit relatives or friends and are out of town. This may cause congestion on highways and at airports. Public transit systems do not run on their regular schedules. In general, public life closes down completely.

Background

The original meaning of Christmas is a special church service, or mass, to celebrate the birth of Christ. The story of the Nativity, or the events surrounding the birth of Jesus, are particularly important in religious celebrations of Christmas. However, many traditions that are around today have their roots in pre-Christian winter festivals. These include the importance of candles and decorations made from evergreen bushes and tree, symbolizing everlasting light and life.

In Roman times, a mid-winter festival was held. This was a relaxing time with a lot of parties and merry making. It was also common to give other people small gifts, such as dolls for children and candles for adults. This festival culminated with the celebration of the winter solstice, which fell on December 25 in the Roman calendar. In Scandinavia, a festival called Yule and lasting up to twelve days was held in late December and early January. In this time people burnt logs and held parties. These customs have influences how Christmas Day is celebrated today in the United States.

The Bible does not give a precise date for the birth of Jesus. It is also unclear when December 25 became associated with the birth of Jesus, although it may have been around two hundred years after his birth. In the early centuries of Christianity, the anniversary of the birth of Jesus was not a cause for celebrations. The idea of turning this day into a celebration started in the early Middle Ages in Europe.

During Reformation and up until the middle of the 1800s, Christmas was often not celebrated because partying and merry making was seen as unchristian. From about 1840, celebrating Christmas became more widespread. December 25 was declared a federal holiday in the United States in 1870. Since then Christmas Day has become a steadily more important holiday.

Symbols

A wide range of people and objects represent Christmas. These include baby Jesus, the Nativity and the Three Kings, but also Santa Claus, reindeer and elves. Common objects at this time of year are pine trees, holly, decorations, fairy lights, candles and presents. Christmas Day is now truly a mix of religious celebration and commercial interests.

THE TOUR

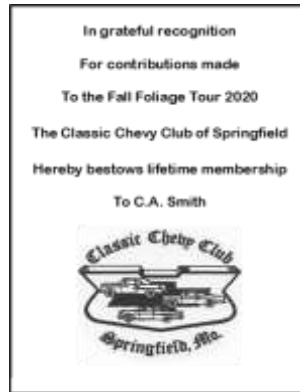

So, tired and sleepy as we were, we decided to continue on to Indianapolis to spend what was left of the night there.

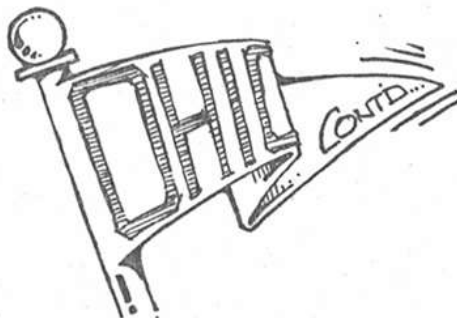

Wednesday was mostly devoted to the picnic and games held at one of the country's nicest dragstrips; National Trails Raceway just outside Columbus.

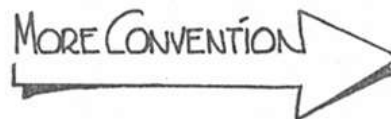
Later in the afternoon and that evening time trials and eliminations got under way for all members wishing to take their classics down the strip which is the home of the Springnationals.

Classic of the Month

'55 Chevy Convertible

The fun began in May of 1971. I found my '55 convertible in a field after hunting more than six months for a good solid convertible. The few, and I do mean few that I ran across previously seemed to be more rust than metal. But finally, I got lucky and found a good one, and wouldn't you know it, less than three miles from my house.. By good I mean that the body's solid. The car had been heavily undercoated and thus saved from the ravages of (shudder) rust, but. . . . someone had "borrowed" the engine, transmission, rear end, hood, and dash wiring harness, not to mention all the little items.

I spent the next year hunting parts so I could just get it running. I was also lucky that all the convertible parts were still on the car, so I didn't have too much trouble getting the rest of the parts that I needed.

After getting it rolling, I began on the body, pounding out the dents and scraping off the three paint jobs it had acquired over the years. I primed and block sanded until I thought my arm was going to fall off. The black lacquer was applied by Melvin Aleshire and it turned out pretty good considering it was my first try at body work.

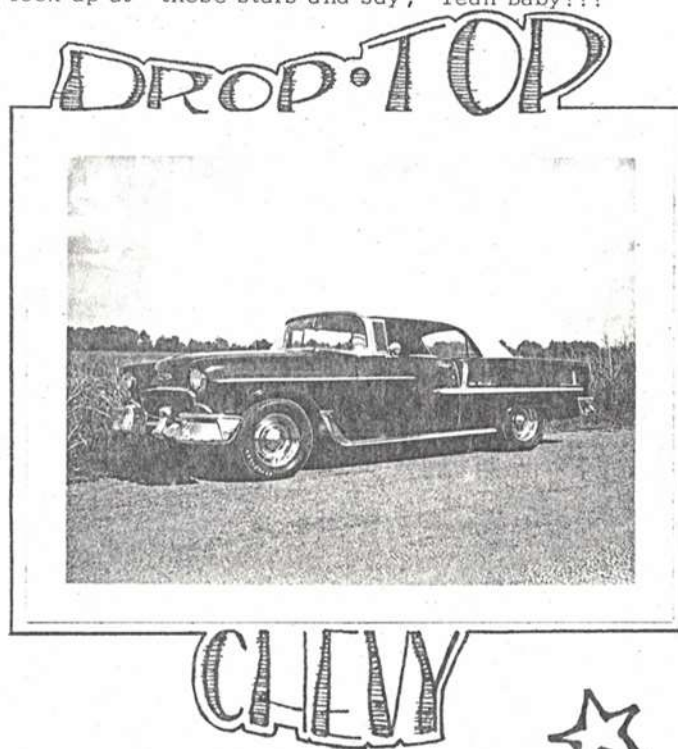
I first bought the car just for fun and summer cruising and to satisfy my dream of owning a convertible, so I had not given the top and interior too much thought until I joined the club and saw all the dazzling paint and interiors. The club gave me new incentive to restore my rag. So, this summer I started all over. I stripped the car completely, removing all the trim, front fenders, engine, and transmission.

I began with the frame, rebuilding the front suspension with new bearings, bushings, and ball joints. Then I sandblasted the front frame and firewall, I installed a stock rebuilt '55 265 hooked to a rebuilt powerglide transmission with the help of Don White one Friday evening. I stripped the body down to the metal and with the help of my wife Carol and brother Bob, we primed and block sanded the car to ready it for the black and clear lacquer which was applied by Bob Napode of Sherwin-Williams. After the paint job I polished the stainless trim and began to put the car back together having Columbus, Ohio in mind, but the Columbus date rolled by and I was unable to take my rag, thanks to a certain upholstery man.

After I returned from the convention, newly inspired, I went back to work to finish the little things on the car for the M.D. show and to find another shop to do the interior.

After rebuilding or replacing practically all mechanical parts on the car, it runs and drives beautifully and gets pretty good gas mileage. By the time you read this article I hope it will be in Carthage, having a new red and white stock interior installed. While working on the car this summer I sometimes wondered if it was worth all the work but every time Carol and I take the car cruising with the top down on a clear and warm summer evening, I look up at those stars and say, "Yeah Baby!!!"

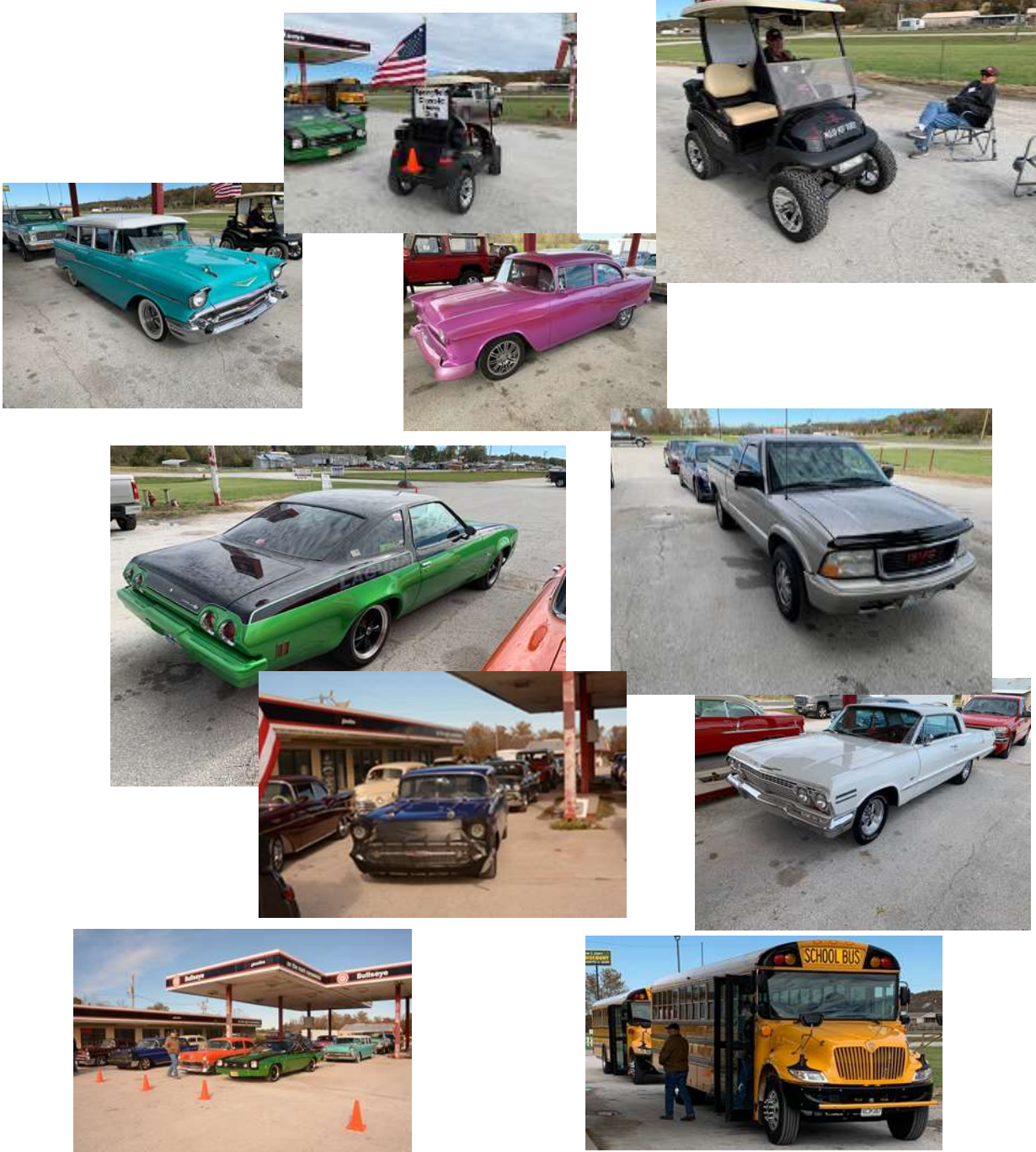
