WILMA WRIGHT'S PUNCH

There were several inquiries about the recipe for the frait punch that Wilma Wright made for the Club Christmas Dinner, so we decided to put it in the newsletter so everyone could have a copy of it;

- l package unsweeted Kool-Aid (Wilma uses Strawberry)
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 two-liter bottle of 7up
- l can pineapple juice
- 1 can Hawaiian Punch
- ½ gallon Orange Sherbet

Mix the Kool-Aid, sugar, 7up, pineapple juice, and Hiwaiian Punch together in a large punch bowl. Then, just before time to serve the punch, you add the Orange Sherbet to the mixture, then add about the same amount of water as it calls for on the package of Kool-Aid and serve.

Anyone who tasted the punch at the Christmas Dinner will tell you that this recipe makes a very good punch.

GITTY GRINBER SANDWICH RECIPE

The following recipe comes from LeAnn Prier. These sandwiches are great for times like Saturday evening supper or for small parties or just for something a little bit different every once in a while.

l loaf of French bread
Approximately 2 pounds of ground beef
Paprika (LeAnn says to use quite a bit)
Garlic (to taste)
Celery Salt (to taste)
Chili Powder (one to two teaspoons)
Salt and Pepper (to taste)
I can of Pizza sauce
Cheese Whiz
Shreaded Mozzerella Cheese
(One package of Chili or Taco seasoning can be substituted for the seasonings)

Brown the ground beef in a large skillet, adding the seasonings and pizza sauce to the beef and let it simmer for several minutes.

Slice the loaf of french bread lengthwise (like you were making a sub sandwich) and spread a layer of Cheese Whiz on the bottom half. Spoon the ground beef mixture on top of the cheese, then top that with a generous amount of the mozzerella cheese. Place the top half of the bread on top of the mozzerella and spread some butter on top of the sandwich and place it in a 350 degree oven until the cheese melts.

Remove the sandwich from the oven and slice it into 4 to 6 individual sandwiches and serve.

Leann says she sometimes uses a mixture of ground beef and hot sausage instead of ground beef plain. If you want an opinion as to how good these super sandwiches are, just ask Mike or Jerry Prier or Bud or Gene or yours truly how well they like them.

CLASSICS IN THE WALL STREET JOURNAL?

The following is a reprint of andarticle I found on the front page of the March 4th, 1981 Wall Street Journal that I thought you might find interesting.

CHEVYS FROM THE *50S ARE REVIVED FOR TRIP DOWN MEMORY LANE

Bob Matheson decided to get rid of his 1980 Corvette, It looked good and ran fine, but frankly, it lacked panache. After all, he says, "anyone with enough money can own a Corvette".

So, the 41-year-old service manager for a Renton, Washington auto dealership drove some 1,100 miles to a plain, single story building in an industrial park in San Dimas, California where he traded his high-priced sports car in on something more dashing - a 24-year-old black Chevrolet BelAir hardtop with 60,000 miles on it. Now Mr. Matheson is riding high.

"This is a hell of a lot bigger ego trip than driving the Corvette. I get 10 times as much attention, people wave, toot their horns, and give me the thumbs-up. It's a kick," he says.

It's also a kick for Bob Wingate, the man who sold Mr. Matheson the 1957 Chevy. Technically, Mr. Wingate is a used-car dealer, but to thousands of automobile cognoscinti around the world, he is the guru of the 1950's vintage Chevrolet. He sells as many gleaming, carefully refurbished 1955 through 1957 Chevys in a year as some small-town showrooms sell new cars.

And his prices would give any red-blooded auto dealership palm-itch - \$8,500 for a nice hardtop, up to \$16,000 for a loaded convertible. That's three to five times what they cost new (Mr. Matheson won't say what his car cost, but it isn't uncommon for Mr. Wingate to take a late model sports and luxury model as partial payment for one of his like-new beauties).

There is nothing unusual, of course, about people buying old cars. Tweedy antique buffs have long polished the brass on their tin lizzies, and well-healed investors have been impressing their board-room pals with quarter-million dollar Deusenburgs. But the growing craze for three specific years of middle-aged Chevrolets is different.

They aren't rare. General Motors built about five million of them and by some estimates there may be as many as a million left. They certainly aren't exotic. In the '50's even more than now, Chevrolets were everymans car. Wheels for the moms, pops, and kids of America. But as is often the case in affairs of the heart, logic counts for naught. So it appears that the very ubiquity of the 1955-57 Chevrolets is providing good times for people like Mr. Matheson and a good living for people like Mr. Wingate.

"It's the desire to get back to the simple, happy days of the '50's;" Mr. Wingate declares. Fords and Plymouths also were plentyful, but "Chevrolet put itself on the map" between 1955 and 1957 with a new, powerful V-8 engine in a lightweight car. "You were 16 and the family car would blow the doors off anything on the street. Now your over 40 and remember the fun you had chasing down Fords, cruising the drive-in and dating your high-school sweetheart."

One might dismiss that as the pitch of a boyish 45year-old car salesman who got his start in 1957 selling new 1957 Chevys and who still punctuates his animated conversations with dated terms like "nervous" (describing

an espacially attractive car) "heat and music" (heater and radio) and "three on the tree" (a steering column gearshift).

But Mr. Matheson is similarly enthusiastic. "Basically, it's nostalgia," he says. "The kids who had money when I was in high school had these. Now when I reach for the radio knob, I wouldn't be surprised to hear Chuck Berry come out."

Al Murrel, a 43-year-old serviceman for Columbia Gas Co, in Toledo, Ohio is another proud owner. "I've never stopped reliving my youth. As a teen-ager in 1957 I had a brand new one and haven't been without one since." At the moment he owns seven.

Doug Morehead of Orlando, Florida understands people like that. The 32-year-old former minister and bible teacher now works full-time as president of the Classic Chevrolet Club International, made up of 30,000 people who own - orwish they owned - *55-*57 Chevys. "The 50's was the last carefree era of the automobile." he says, "before worrying about pollution, safety and energy crisis descended on motorists and emasculated their machines."

"The Chevrolet was the common-man's car. That's who had them then and that's who wants them now." he says. The typical member of his flock, he says, is a middle-income, blue-collar worker. About half restore their car themselves, but some prefer to buy them after the work is done. "I saw one man buying a beautiful 1955 convertible lay \$17,000 in cash down on the hood," he says.

Mr. Wingate bills his company as "The worlds largest vintage Chevrolet dealership". He says he averages a sale a day, and 75% of his sales are 55-57 Chevrolets. His gross sales last year were 2.5 million dollars, but a cost increase cut his profit from a year erlier.

He includes a 25% mark-up on most prices, hoping to settle for a 15% profit after dickering. He will help with financing, and he offers a guarantee - from 12 months or 12,000 miles on a completely rebuilt car to "two minutes or two feet" on a rough one being wholesaled.

He claims there is little risk to him. "People drive these cars like they're the last cars on earth. They don't get over 55, they change the oil every other Tuesday and leave them home if it rains," he says.
